ELECTION OF PARENT GOVERNORS

When a vacancy arises on the governing body for a parent representative, the Local Education Authority will inform all parents of the vacancy and will make the necessary arrangements for the subsequent election. Every parent of a registered pupil at the school will be entitled to stand as a candidate and to vote at the election, and will be given the opportunity to do so. Each parent will be provided with a letter, which will indicate eligibility to stand, nominate and vote in elections and which will include a nomination form which provides for a proposed nomination, seconder, acceptance of nomination and any personal statement the nominee wishes to offer, to be returned to the school concerned by a set date. Elections will be by secret ballot.

The next scheduled election of Parent Governors will take place in the Spring term 2017.

No annual Parents' meeting was held in the academic year 2014 – 2015 in accordance with Section 94 of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013.

CAREERS AND THE WORLD OF WORK

Bassaleg School recognises that a vital part of a student's education is impartial careers advice, information and guidance; this is part of the school curriculum. The Careers and the World of Work lessons are designed to promote the DCELLS Learning Outcomes of Careers and the World of Work framework.

Careers Information

All students are entitled to seek specific guidance from:

Heads of Year and support staff

Careers Wales who interview students in years 11 and 12 and other year groups on request.

Careers and the World of Work Education

A planned programme is in place to develop the skills and range of knowledge students need to make informed choices about continuing education, training and employment. At Key Stage 3 the Careers programme is delivered in Learning for Life lessons by the students' tutor, which supports them in making their option choices in year 9. At Key Stage 4 the programme guides students towards their individual career paths, strengthens their knowledge of self and makes them more financially aware.

ADDITIONAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

The school has adopted the Additional Educational Needs Policy of the Newport Local Education Authority.

Pupils are identified as having additional educational needs through close links with all partner primary schools. Visits and consultations with teaching staff take place while pupils are in year 6 and the AEN Coordinator attends Annual Reviews of Statemented pupils in year 6 provided that they live within the catchment. In addition, all pupils undertake assessments on arrival in Bassaleg, which further helps the identification process.

Pupils identified as having additional educational needs are provided with appropriate support. This includes in class or withdrawal support by teachers or Learning Support Assistants; withdrawal for literacy and/or numeracy programmes; regular monitoring by AEN and Pastoral teams with the support of external agencies. Pupils on the AEN Register have Individual Education Plans (IEPs), which show interventions additional to or different from those provided as part of the school's usual differentiated curriculum and strategies. These are devised after consultation between staff, parents and pupils and reviewed in line with the AEN Code of Practice.



Currently, all year 7 pupils are placed in mixed ability registration groups. Those pupils who have been identified as having more complex additional educational needs are supported through additional classroom support provided by Learning Support Assistants. In years 8 and 9 there is usually a small group provision available for pupils with AEN. At Key Stages 4 and 5 pupils pursue courses appropriate to their needs.

DISABLED PUPILS

The school makes every effort to accommodate pupils who have various disabilities subject to the access constraints to some of the buildings. Further information is available from Newport City Council.



CURRICULUM

Bassaleg's curriculum is designed to be broad, balanced, flexible, relevant and inclusive, matching the needs of individual learners.

All pupils in Key Stage 3 follow the National Curriculum. In Key Stage 4 the curriculum meets the Learning Skills Measure (2009). At Key Stage 5 all students have the choice of studying a curriculum that significantly exceeds the 14 - 19 Learning Pathways. This offer is part of the Newport West Post-16 Partnership.

COMMUNITY LINKS

MOSSS - Model of Secondary Schools Support

This enterprise continues to grow in terms of its effectiveness and impact within the school and the wider community.

The MOSSS project brings together key partners within the community to ensure that our young people's needs and challenges are met and supported, in and out of school.

This sharing of information between the major stakeholders – School (Pastoral Support Officers, Learning Coach) Police, Educational Welfare Service, Newport Youth Service, Families First, Careers (for NEET identification) and Preventative Services is a crucial aspect of this initiative and allows specific interventions to be put in place in order that difficulties affecting our young people in school, at home and in their local communities are addressed. This partnership sharing process alerts all stakeholders to any necessary concerns that arise.

ASSOCIATION OF THE PARENTS & FRIENDS OF BASSALEG SCHOOL

SCHOOL STUDENT COUNCIL

The School Student Council meet on a regular basis and as part of this group the Head Boy and Head Girl attend Governors' meetings. The council has also drawn up their own constitution which each council member now signs following their election.

In the last year the Council has discussed the use of mobile phones in school and have helped draft a new policy together with the Senior Leadership Team for their safe use in school.

The Council have also taken an active role in the development of mental health in school which remains a focus for the Council this year.

YSGOL BASALEG – DWYIEITHRWYDD/ BASSALEG SCHOOL: BILINGUALISM

In Bassalea, we pride ourselves on the use of Bilingualism across the school. Since 2011, Bassaleg has developed many new and exciting initiatives to incorporate and encourage incidental Welsh to be used across the school. Each Department actively promotes bilingualism in their teaching with incidental Welsh being used and bilingual resources are on display in every classroom. The Welsh Department have introduced incidental Welsh lessons for staff to develop their confidence and to assist in teaching commands that are subject specific. Pupils have been involved in developing bilingualism across the school from being part of the Bilingualism and Eisteddfod Committees to voting for the teacher to win the 'Incidental Welsh' award. By involving pupils in the organisation of the Eisteddfod and developments with Bilingualism, a sense of ownership and responsibility ensures that pupils are aware of the importance of bilingualism and its promotion. Each department is actively involved in contributing to the Eisteddfod celebrations which creates a whole school community. Bilingualism has been welcomed by the staff at Bassaleg School and bilingual comments are now used in reports to parents in every subject. These comments have been translated to ensure that there are subject specific targets available bilingually and a comment bank on the reporting system has been created for easy access for teachers. The Welsh Department have attended Bilingualism conferences with schools in their family and have also held meetings with another school to display their resources and share good practice. Bilingualism has gone from strength to strength in the past two years and is now a prominent aspect of life at Bassaleg School. Pupils have embraced the use of incidental Welsh and compete to win the Welsh Learner of the term and Welsh Learner of the Year. Bilingualism has grown steadily in the past four years and it is a regular feature in the newsletter and bulletins. Staff have embraced this and it is now a stronger and more prominent element in life at Ysgol Basaleg.

EDUCATION ACHIEVEMENT SERVICE

SNAG / Healthy Schools

SNAG is the School Nutrition Action Group. The SNAG committee for this year have been tasked with identifying issues and concerns regarding healthy eating. This new and enthusiastic group have firstly focussed on interviews and questionnaires to attempt to find out the views of students and staff.

The group felt that they would ascertain from the school community their views on the variety and quality of the food and drink available within school and also they wished to discover the views of students regarding the facilities available within the school.

There were concerns over space and queue pushing and the group wished to identify ways in which this aspect could be improved. The group were keen to link this discussion with a far greater link to wellbeing and were keen to offer guidance and advice on various food types to the school population with suggestions for improving and then maintaining a healthy lifestyle. The group will return their findings to School Council and the Leadership team and will meet with Chartwells, the school catering company, to discuss the findings.

Toilet Facilities

The toilets are all cleaned at the end of every day, and during the day we have a day cleaner who visits all toilets to make sure that there is an adequate supply of toilet paper and the soap dispensers are full, clean as necessary. This is in conjunction with checks that the caretakers make between morning and evening shifts.
